<u>1 Peter 1:13-2:3</u> The Call to Holiness

Believers are called to be sanctified people who live holy lives. Holiness means being set apart by God for His purposes. This process of sanctification begins when we receive Jesus Christ as our personal Savior, and it continues for the rest of our lives.

The Holy Spirit draws our will and longings to align with His. As we submit to Him, we will begin to desire what He desires. With His leading, we will choose to consecrate our conduct, our conversation, and ultimately our character to God alone. He teaches us how to make holiness a way of life rather than see it as some lofty place of enlightenment we can never reach. God has placed us where we live and work, not to be "pious" or to isolate ourselves as if in incubators, but to reflect who Christ is as we walk among other people. If we are in the process of being conformed to Jesus' likeness, then the longer we live and mature spiritually, the more others should be able to recognize the Savior in us. Our hearts should grow softer, and our willingness to love and serve should increase.

If we are Christ's ambassadors, then our lives must be holy; otherwise, we are misrepresenting Him. If we are the body of Christ, then our hands are His hands, our eyes are His eyes, and our feet are His feet. When we allow Jesus to speak, love, and serve through us, others will be compelled to ask why we live such vibrant lives. All followers of Christ are called to be holy. To answer this call daily is to embrace the Great Commission.

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Dear Church Family,

As a member of the PNC, I am excited about the possibility of hiring a new pastor in the next few months. I choose this devotional reading to encourage all of us to think about how all of us can be the hands, eyes and feet at Christ and his church.

Once the PNC completes the search process, we must give our new pastor time to settle in, to try new things, to get to know people. I would implore you to be patient, to encourage him or her, to be supportive, and to get involved yourself. The pastor's job is not to be everything and to do everything for all of the people. They have a family, a life, and personal responsibilities too. My own father was a pastor, and I know how people had high expectations of him and his family Many times, people were quick to react or criticize if he wasn't available for them, or do things as they felt they should be done. It was impossible for him to please everyone.

Today though, people use their email as a way to communicate, rather than face to face. This can often cause misunderstandings when the pastor can only read, and not discuss the issue with you in person. Again, I ask you to use sensitivity, to offer assistance as the pastor learns how to fill his/her role, to be slow to anger, and not be critical of others.

I pray our new pastor will be encouraged by each member here as we try to live a "vibrant' life for Christ.

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Yummy Pies for Sale



OCTOBER NEWS FROM THE HAITI MISSION SCHOOL

As I write this, we are preparing for the annual meeting of the Board of Directors for the *Friends of Siloam School at Labastille* AKA the Haiti Mission School. I would have preferred to write this after the meeting, but church newsletter schedules take precedence. Several major topics will be on the agenda, most of them formed by the decision of the Haitian government to begin paying our teachers. It will clearly affect our budget and future plans. So much rides on how the new arrangement works out. We are taking a "wait and see" attitude with no new programs beginning this year. And of course, we continue to pray for God's wisdom and work in this and we hope you are continuing to pray with us.

Tom and JoEllen will travel to Haiti in November to see how things are going at the school and to meet the board in Jeremie, We also hope to meet with a representative of the Education Dept. in Port Au Prince. We have numerous questions and some thoughts for them. First, we wonder if they have future plans in the area and if so how they will affect our school.

We anticipate having a full school this year with somewhere in the range of 125 students in k-6th grades. As far as we know, all our teachers will be returning. We are continuing to provide scholarships for the five students that passed their exams in secondary school last year, and are adding six more from last year's graduates of HMS.

We have just learned that the school they are attending which is sponsored by a Catholic organization in Canada has outfitted a classroom with brand new computers, printers, etc., and a generator to provide electricity. As a result, we have been told all the students at the secondary school will be getting an hour of instruction in computers daily and it will cost us \$3 additional tuition per student. Imagine, \$103/year total tuition including computer instruction!!!

A Biblical Basis for Missions by the Mission Committee

The Mission Committee was recently asked if there is a biblical basis for missions. It was an interesting question, because to us it seems that the heart of what it means to be Christian is in our missions. Here is some of what we found:

Jesus was the first Christian missionary. His mission was to teach the world about God's love. He demonstrated what it means to be in mission. He provided food, he taught, he healed, and most of all he loved everyone that he met. He showed through word and action what a loving God we have.

Before he left, he commanded his disciples to do the same, and even more. In John 21, for instance, he asks Peter if Peter loves him. When Peter says "You know I do," Jesus tells him to "feed"



my sheep... take care of my lambs." In Acts 1, just before he ascends, he says "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you and you will be my witnesses I have shown you] in all Judea, and Samaria and to the ends of the earth."

Following his ascension, the *idea* of missions really took off in the early Christian church. We read in the book of Acts how one of the first things the church did was to provide daily food for widows. (Jesus had talked many times about providing for widows and orphans). In fact this became such a big responsibility, that they appointed deacons to take over that function, so that the Apostles could continue their primary mission of spreading

the word.


Our word *Mission* comes from the Latin word "mission" which means "to send," or "one sent forth". This idea came directly from our Lord who told the disciples to "*Therefore, go [or as you go], make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you…"[Matthew 28:19. Since we are his disciples, as we go, we are to make disciples, baptize and teach.*

The call to missions also comes from "The great commandment": "You shall love the Lord, your God with all your heart, soul, strength and mind, and you shall love your neighbor as yourself." [Matthew 22:36-40] Thus it seems that a major part of our calling as Christians is to reach out to our neighbors, make disciples, love and take care of the Lord's flock [the world].

When we hear about missions, we often think in terms of giving money. The truth is that money is an important aspect of missionary work. Still, giving money is not the heart of what the bible says about missions. It is simply one the means of going about missions. In fact, you can do all of the above without giving a cent if that is your call.

So back to the original question: Is it biblical? It seems that it would be nearly impossible to fulfill Jesus' command to us, his disciples without missions and missionaries—those who, as we go out, serve, and teach about God, the Holy Spirit, Jesus, and the bible. We are those who baptize and make disciples. Mission is, it seems, how Jesus showed us to live as Christians.

As I write I can hardly believe that September is almost over. Grandparents' Day will be held at the Preschool tomorrow (September 26,2014).

It is so encouraging to see the support of our families as we have at least 18 families who are sending grandparents to our school tomorrow. It is great to work with chil-

dren whose families show such love and interest in them.

Our students have all settled into our program at the preschool. It is amazing how these little ones can learn the routine so quickly and find comfort in the boundaries that have been clearly set for their protection and development. We have had so many encouraging words from our families about their experience so far. One mom said that her daughter didn't know she was still in the room and when her sweet girl turned around from putting her backpack up she had a huge smile on her face. Mom said, "I saw pure JOY on her face, that gave me the assurance that we had made the right decision for our daughter to come here."

Our classes are about filled to capacity. We have 12 students in the 4's class and 11 students in the 3's class. On Monday, we will add one more to the 4's and we are talking with another family who may start in January. The word is getting out that "this is the place to be". We are hearing that many are coming because of what our families are telling about their experience here. They may not realize it, but because we ask **Jesus** to be part of all that we do, He is the one who is making the difference in our preschool.

Thanks for being a part of all that is going on in the preschool. We are seeing students who love to be here and students who think that learning is fun!!
