I read a story in the latest issue of Weavings that struck me: an 86 year old woman with severe arthritis found herself overtaken by wonder. One morning she was sitting at her kitchen table when a sunbeam lit up her crystal saltshaker, setting off a beautiful shower of color and light. The woman mused about how she missed all the other times this must have happened during the fifty years she sat at that same table. And that thought led her to wonder how much else she had failed to notice, preoccupied as she was with getting things done. "This was it, this was grace," she said. "I needed crippled hands before I could sit still. Sometimes you have to be stopped right there in your tracks before you can see that all the beauty in life is right in front of you." It is a well-timed reminder in this season of Lent to *make time* for stillness and communion with God. And in our full, oftentimes overflowing lives, we can pass by the moments for wonder, renewal, and grace. One practice that is gaining prevalence is centering prayer, which is rooted in contemplative prayer reaching back to the Desert Fathers. Thomas Keating is a Trappist Monk and Priest and is one of the architects of centering prayer. He emphasizes that centering prayer is not so much an exercise in concentrating or focusing our attention on something, but rather it is primarily concerned with *intention*, that is being present to God's presence and action within us. It begins very simply with setting aside 20 minutes in our day. We find a comfortable position, and we open ourselves to God's presence. We choose a sacred word such as *love* or *peace* or *Spirit* that helps focus our thoughts. As our mind inevitably wanders or as interruptions creep in, we return to that sacred word to help us remain in communion with our Creator, basking in God's presence with us, and listening for God's action in us.

The remarkable thing about centering prayer is the way this stillness and peace flow into the active parts of our day and influence how we manage in the busyness and cacophony of life: the decisions we make about when to speak and when to keep silent, what we say, what we do or don't do. Bathed in God's presence, we become more attentive to God's luminous activity right before us in all the simple ordinary moments of every day, like noticing a band of spectacular light beaming from a salt shaker at the breakfast table. Theologian Michael Downey eloquently wrote: "devotional practices are the scaffolding that supports us, especially in our darkest hour." May our devotional practices yield such moments of grace.

O God of the barking dog and chirping bird,
O God of light streaming into this space
Through scattered bits of rainbow glass
Around the cross-hung body of your Son:
Replace our security with risk,
our abundance with sacrifice,
our brokenness with your healing,
that we might start to live
in the joy of your grace. Amen.



# Free Tax Return Preparation

Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA) sponsored by Cornell Cooperative Extension of Warren County is offering free tax help to families and individuals whose household income is below \$53,000. Trained community volunteers can help you with special credits, such as Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), up to \$6,143, if you earn less than \$52,427. In addition to free tax return preparation assistance, free electronic filing (e-filing) will be offered. Individuals taking advantage of the e-file program will receive their refunds in half the time compared to returns filed on paper – even faster if you have your refund deposited directly into your bank account. Tax Returns with stock sales, business or rental income cannot be completed by us. To schedule a tax appointment in Warren County call Cornell Cooperative Extension at 518-623-3291, for Washington County call 1-800-211-5128, for Pearl Street, Glens Falls and SUNY Adirondack call 211.

"What's the catch?" usually followed up my statement. "There is no catch, we are just trying to really outreach to entrepreneurs that need small loans and don't have access to credit, we trust you will appreciate this loan and repay it back". Silence filled the room while I continued to explain...

Kiva Microfunds (commonly known by its domain name, Kiva.org) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that allows people to lend money via the Internet to low-income / underserved entrepreneurs and students in over 70 countries. Kiva's mission is "to connect people through lending to alleviate poverty." Kiva works with microfinance institutions on five continents to provide loans to people without access to traditional banking systems. They work with:

290 Field Partners
450 volunteers around the world
85 different countries

Since Kiva was founded in 2005:

1,249,750 Kiva lenders \$657,137,825in loans

98.79% repayment rate

#### **Haiti Mission School News for March 2015**

The Board of the "Friends of the Siloam School at Labastille" otherwise (AKA Haiti Mission School) met on Saturday Feb. 7. One of the major issues concerned advanced education for our teachers. Currently the Director and one of the remaining five teachers have college degrees. Three of the others are attending night school and working on their teaching degrees. The Board discussed whether we should require our teachers to be credentialed, and if so should we assist them. It was determined rather than requiring it, we should offer to pay half of their tuition of \$250/year. We also decided we should give a \$50 merit increase in pay for teachers with a degree.

It was also agreed we would pay for a three-day seminar for teachers prior to the beginning of the 2015-16 school year, negotiate a salary increase for the coming year, and continue offering scholarships for secondary school for another 6 students. We are able to do all these things thanks to increased donations over the past year. We intend to address them when we go to Haiti at the beginning of March.


The Jèrèmie Committee called for a general meeting on Saturday January 9 with the teachers, the Labastille Church leaders, the two women who cook and the Director of the school. The teachers had asked for the meeting to deal with some concerns they had with the director. The meeting lasted six hours and we have heard it was quite positive. Apparently there were many smiles at the end of the meeting. This is the first time the Committee at Jèrèmie has assumed the leadership in this way and it was pleasing to our Board here. The Haitians have often tended to wait for us to take the lead, while we remind them that they are our representatives there. It all seems to be a part of two cultures attempting to work together. While in Haiti in March, we intend to encourage them to keep up this good work. Our hope continues to be they will manage the school, while we provide general guidance and continue to work with them on funding issues.

The March trip alluded to above is our annual business trip when we take pictures of all the students, meet with the teachers, the food manager, the Jèrèmie and Labastille committees and negotiate next year's contract, etc.. We also hope to meet with Mr Jean Claude Guyometre, of the Haitian Education Department who has been instrumental in trying to help move toward government takeover of salaries for the teachers.

Then during the April school break in New York, we are taking a team of six from the Bay Road Presbyterian Church in Queensbury NY. We plan to introduce them to the country, the culture and the Haitian people through a bus trip from Port Au Prince to Jèrèmie, visiting the school, hospital, orphanages and in homes. The team is planning to bring school T-shirts for all the students with the school logo, and also will be bringing team shirts for the soccer teams. While at the school, we will also give out the bibles to the children finishing third grade and watch an intramural soccer (futbòl) match.

On Tuesday Feb 10, we met with a Girl Scout troop at the Ballard Road School in Wilton, NY. We shared a Power Point presentation about life in Haiti and the school at Labastille. Following the presentation, the girls had many excellent questions. One questioned about the earthquake. We realized that in 2010, they had all been too young to watch the news or to know about the earthquake. Time flies..... The troop is helping with soccer team T-shirts for the group trip. We really enjoy having an opportunity to share about Haiti with others, and encourage you to invite us to share the story with your church or any other group of which you are a part.
