We were very excited about the record turnout for Rally Sunday. We were reminded to THINK before we use our words, and we made some very Nice Prayer rocks the glow in the dark. Great Start!!

We have selected a curriculum this year that will follow the same Lectionary that Pastor Ali will be preaching from in worship. Our thinking is as follows:

- Children and parents can leave church and be able to reinforce their lesson for the day with each other. They may get a different perspective from each other and encourage conversation at home.

- If we have more parents and members involved in Sunday school classes they will not miss out on the lectionary in worship, they will be teaching the same lesson Pastor Ali will be preaching.

We are trying to make it easier for our parents and congregants to get more involved with the children's Spiritual growth here at Caldwell. It is a wonderful example for our children to see us worshiping the Lord together, and for our own children to see us in such a role as teacher. Elder Responsibilities and Functions

The Session of the Presbyterian Church is that body authorized by the constitution of the Presbyterian Church (USA) to lead the congregation in its spiritual life. The Session should consist of twelve elders, elected by the congregation and installed for service for three years, plus the pastor, who serves as the moderator.

- An Elder is first to be a leader who participates in the mission and ministry of the church
- > An Elder is a Presbyterian. As a member of a connectional denomination, elders participate in the life of the Albany Presbytery, the Synod of the Northeast and the General Assembly, when so designated.
- Caldwell Elders chair a committee which carries out the mandate of the Session, initiates plans, and fulfills the mission thrust of the local ministry of Christ.
- > Session committees include cross sections of the membership, recruited from across the congregation.

Deacon Responsibilities and Functions

The Office of Deacon of the Presbyterian Church as set forth in Scripture is one of sympathy, witness, and service after the example of Jesus Christ. Persons of spiritual character, honest repute, of exemplary lives, brotherly and sisterly love, warm sympathies, and sound judgment are chosen for this office.

The Office of Deacon consists of a minimum of six Deacons, elected by the congregation and installed for service for two years.

The duty of the Deacon is: \succ To minister to those in need \blacktriangleright To the sick \succ To the friendless To any who may be in distress Deacons shall assume other duties as may be designated to them by the Session

DEACON'S CORNER

We are sharing in the <u>October mission of the month</u>. We are currently assisting approximately 35 families per month through our food pantry which equates to over 100 people helped per month. Families can come to both pantries and records are kept of their visits. Monthly records are then sent to the Regional Food Bank.

Food pantry families come from Lake George, Queensbury and Warrensburg. Our pantry clientele is also offered holiday meal baskets at Thanksgiving and Easter. Thanksgiving baskets are also offered to families within the school district. We work with the school nurse to identify these families. Some of our recipients have helped with our bi-annual rummage sale, we offer them credit at the sale in exchange for time volunteered.

Faithful, loving and helpful volunteers spend approximately 3 hours on each pantry distribution. It operates smoothly from the sign in, to shopping and bagging.

The pantry counts on mission money, grants and outside donations for operating. The church allocated pantry budget for 2016 from was approximately \$4200. We have seen a slight growth of recipients over the past several years. We have tried to implement cost cutting strategies as our operating budget has been stretched to the maximum in order to provide healthy food as well as household goods. We rely on a yearly grant from the Regional Food Bank. This year's 2016 grant was \$2600. You can also contribute by donating canned goods, personal care items, and boxed food that is not out of date.

October News from the Haiti Mission School



School is open in Haiti. Students returned on Sept 7 to open the tenth year of the school. Starting with a single class of K/1 in 2007/8, we now have six grades, a complete primary school. We anticipate another year of full classes with a total of about 150 pupils. We have graduated four classes and 15 of our top graduates are attending a nearby secondary school with scholarships provided through the Haiti Mission School. The picture below shows the students with their new French-English dictionaries. They have hopes of becoming pastors, teachers, lawyers, doctors and even President.

Speaking of which, Haiti has scheduled its Presidential election for Oct. 9th. Candidates in Haiti cannot begin electioneering until 30 days prior to the

election. At this

point, we are certain that many Americans would appreciate an election cycle limited to 30 days. We are eager, as are our Haitian friends, to see the <u>election completed and a new President installed.</u>

We were saddened to hear that one of our students, a first grader died this past summer. As usual, there was scant information about the cause of his death. Marc Arthur Francois, child of God, date of birth.





We predict our costs to remain about the same for 2016-17. (\$65.00 for food & \$65.00 for student education). One reason for this is the exchange rate between Haiti and the U.S., which has been in our favor for the past few years. Another positive result of the exchange rate was the teacher seminar. We were able to afford 4 days this year instead of the 3 we have had for the past couple of years. The teachers have reported in the past that the seminars, coming just before school opens in the fall, help to prepare them and energize them as they return in September.

The question of government pay for teachers is still up in the air. The program is still available and all the necessary paperwork has been submitted. We are waiting for approval

from the education department. Of course, the government still is not paying their already promised funds to teachers, so the point may

be moot. In any case, though we pay less, there is something to be said for the fact that we pay them regularly.

We hope you will take a look at the web page for the school (www.haitimissionschool.org). We are at work making it more up-to-date and useful. A big thankyou to Mark Mannix of Mannix Marketing for his help.



October Mission of the Month: Clean Drinking Water for Chateau

For my Eagle Scout Project, I am working to provide clean water to a town in Haiti called Chateau. I chose Haiti because I learned from our church mission group that this country is the poorest in the northern hemisphere and that there was an earthquake just outside of Haiti's capital Port au Prince in 2010 that devastated the country. 270,000 people lost their lives that day. The town of Chateau is in Northwest Haiti. The people that live in Chateau have a church with many little orphans living there. According to the World Food Program, less than 50 percent of households in Haiti have access to safe water and only 25 percent benefit from adequate sanitation. In addition, one-hundred thousand children under five years of age don't have enough food. The people that live in Chateau are so excited that they used the money I already raised to construct the walls and piping for the cistern to collect rain water. However, I need more funds to build a filter to make the water drinkable. The filter that is going to be used is called a biosand filter. It uses sand, rocks, and a tank to sanitize the rain water that will be collected from the metal roof of the church. This project will provide enough clean water for the entire town of Chateau, including the orphans, as well as water for plants and livestock.

I am hoping to raise \$3,000 to build the biosand filter and teach the people of Chateau how to use and repair the filter. I am performing this work for the non-for-profit Voice of the Children Foundation and I am planning to go to Haiti over February break to complete this project with them and members of our congregation.
