### HUMAN FLOURISHING

What does a flourishing life look like? Miroslav Volf, professor of Systematic Theology and Director of Yale Center for Faith and Culture, in his recently published book *Flourishing: Why We Need Religion in a Globalized World* (2016), is essentially asking, what does the good life look like? Is my flourishing tied to others? Can I flourish if others are not? Does my flourishing depend on the flourishing of the world? Our faith, as Christ has shown, is based on love. So how do we expand our capacity to love deeply?

When I think about this from a Christian perspective, our faith teaches us that our life is not ultimately about only ourselves or our individual needs. Our faith challenges us to ask in what ways is my life serving or in solidarity with the people in the world. Our faith takes us outside ourselves and into the body politic.

This is not a new idea for us. Engaging the life of the world is at the core of being Presbyterian. It was central to John Calvin's understanding of what it means to be the church. Calvin imagined a church whose authority was not in its hierarchy, but in its people. That was a revolutionary idea at the time (and, by the way, one that our founders infused to the building of our nation and form of governance). Calvin said that not only does the individual have the right to participate in the governance of authority, but also that no authority has the right to coerce the individual's conscience. God alone is Lord of the conscience.

Embedded in what it means to live faithfully is the very Presbyterian idea to be informed, to stay educated on the issues of the day, and to express our faith beliefs, not just in our personal lives, and in our morality, but in a larger sense, to engage in the world in compassionate and just ways through political action.

On the Caldwell Church website <u>www.caldwellpres.org</u>, our Mission Committee has posted contact information for our state and national representatives. I urge all of us to visit our website and take a moment to voice your views to our representatives and engage in matters that you find yourself passionate about.

Secondly, this month we have a unique opportunity to engage in another very important faith practice, to explore how to deepen our spiritual disciplines that undergird our lives. Rev. Adele Calhoun will lead us on a midwinter Spiritual Retreat for the Soul. How can we more fully commune with our Creator, develop practices that will engage our faith and make a meaningful difference in the indwelling of peace in our lives? How do we face our own brokenness, relinquish the "false self," and flourish as sons and daughters of God? Sponsored by the sister churches of Lake George, we will meet at St. James for the first session on Friday evening, February 17, registration at 5:30, dinner where you'd like in Lake George, and first session from 7-8:30 p.m. We will reconvene Saturday from 8:30 until 3 p.m. I hope you will join me for what I know will be a very worthwhile experience.

May you flourish in new ways this February, and beyond.

# Book Study Group will meet Weds., Feb. 8th



News from the Haiti Mission School

The hustle and bustle of the Christmas season is now over, and it's time to get back to work. For the leadership team of the Haiti Mission School, that means, among other things, it's time to get out donor tax letters. For JoEllen that means a chance to look at all the pictures of our students and to think about each one of them individually as she hand-writes notes about the students to nearly every donor. In the picture at right, she is hard at work. This year has been especially difficult for her as she was reminded of the many painful individual situations.

Often when there are big events such as Hurricane Matthew, I (Tom) tend to get caught up in the big picture... in the massive devastation... in the destruction of buildings... and the worry of how to replace them... in how to get supplies to Haiti, in the concerns about the future, etc. For JoEllen, taking time to pause... to remember each individual and to pray for each one by name is a labor of love.

Thanks to the Hurricane, times are difficult for our Haitian friends in the Labastille area... even more difficult than usual. Many still have only temporary roofs or are still living in tents. Food is scarce. Schools, for the most part are just now starting up. Rain and wind has been persistent, sometimes ripping away tarps covering housing, leading to a discouragement that according to our friends is palpable. Tempers tend to flare up easily.



On top of this came the news that Guy Phillipe, a duly elected member of the Haitian Senate from the Jèrèmie area was arrested and deported to the States.

He has been on a wanted list in Haiti and the States for some time for alleged drug involvement (among other charges). The authorities' concern was that once he was installed in the Senate he would be immune to prosecution. The story is a long and involved one with politics involved and therefore a large degree of uncertainty as to the truth. The point, however, is that when word got out of his arrest, crowds began to form in Jèrèmie that blamed the U.S. They went after *blans...* white folk. Nearly all *blans* from the Jèrèmie area, including a team of 16 people working with our friend Lindsay Anderson, were hustled out by the Jèrèmie police to the U.N. compound, where they spent the night before being flown to Port Au Prince. As far as we know, no one was hurt in the melee, although the hotel where we stay was trashed along with many of the team's personal possessions. In the picture at left, you can see smoke from tires burning in the rioting.

The discouragement for our friends in Haiti, is that they know that nearly every blan is there trying to



help. We are not the enemy. It is a lesson, however, in how crowds can get out of hand, especially when politics are involved and people are hurting and angry. Someone needs to be blamed and skin color is so easy to identify. The truth is that sooner or later (we hope sooner) this issue too shall die down, and cooler heads will eventually prevail.

We are trying to keep our focus on the school and the issues of the Labastille area: (1) get the kids back in school as soon as possible, which includes a lot of supply and infrastructure issues; (2) make certain that seeds are distributed to farmers; (3) get some food to area residents; (4) provide water purification kits; and (5) pray unceasingly for God' advice, guidance, leadership and support, and that we will pay attention. As this is written, our friend Bryan Bartow is attempting to free a container from customs that contains four tents (10x20) that can be used as temporary classroom space.

Current plans are for a 6-member team to head to Haiti in February. They plan bring more water purification kits and work together with

our Haitian counterparts to lay plans for the future of the school. One other aspect of the trip is an Eagle Scout project relating to a cistern for a church/orphanage at Chateau that Howard has been working with.

We continue to seek your prayers as we attempt to get the school moving again and help the Haitians at Labastille to get back on their feet.
