
I arise today, through God's strength to pilot me, God's might to uphold me,

# MARCH 2021 NEWS FROM THE HAITI MISSION SCHOOL

#### HAITI REMAINS IN TURMOIL

Although it may not seem all that different from our own country, the nation of Haiti continues in turmoil. This week, the President asked for the retirement of three members of the Supreme Court. The legislature has not been reconstituted since it was dissolved earlier in the year. There is no agreement on when President Moise's term of office ends ( a long story). He maintains that it is February of 2022. Others say that it ended this week, and the now opposition has installed their own "President" at Cap Haitiene. This does not bode well for Haiti! The good news is COVID19 is still not affecting large numbers of Haitians. As of this date (Feb. 12), according to the World Health Organization, there have still only been 244 deaths out of 11 million people.

#### **BIBLE DONATION**

Thanks to a special donation from one of our supporters, bibles in the French language (Psalms and New Testament) have been given to all of our secondary students. This has been one of their re-quests to us. We hope in the coming months to be able to expand this program to the lower grades. This is the picture of the students with their new bibles.

#### Get to Know You Project: Peg Earl By: Emily Fuller

Growing up, 97 year old Mrs. Earl had a tough early life but found ways to have fun. Mrs. Earl's mother was an only child and orphan who grew up on a farm in Vermont. They used to visit Keene Valley where her dad owned a hotel, but unfortunately it burnt down when she was around 6. Luckily, her family also had a few cottages in Keene Valley. Her family life was complicated because she was a child of divorce. Sadly, her dad had to go to Pennsylvania for a job as an adjuster while her mom worked in NYC as a nurse. "It's not ideal to be a child of divorce" she said and "I was sorry ever since." Like her mother, Mrs. Earl was also adopted by a couple when her mother was called to France as a Red Cross Nurse during the war. She explained to me that during the war, there were hard times. People lived off rations because food was scarce and you couldn't go to the store and buy anything you wanted. Although she didn't starve living off rations, she said they weren't very exciting. "Money is not like it is today, there was a lot less money in those days" she said.

Despite the war, Mrs. Earl found ways to have fun. During the winter, there was a hockey rink where she skated a lot. In the summer, she went to outdoor movie places similar to the drive in's. On top of that, she was athletic and played basketball. When she visited Keene Valley, she attended dances at the firehouse where a lot of the locals played instruments. She remembers one performer, Doctor Golf, who played the drums. Some of the popular dances were round dancing, square dancing, waltz, fox trot, the do-si-do. I asked her what type of clothing styles were popular during her teens and Mrs. Earl said that there were no extreme types of clothes but that jeans were popular. She only wore formal wear to church on Sundays, never to the dances.

Mrs. Earl's education was a long journey. She started school in NYC but since there was no 7th grade, she went to a private school on the Hudson River. She had to walk to get to a bus that would take her part of the way and then walk even more to get to school. She never learned to drive until after marriage so she took the bus a lot. Mrs. Earl attended college at New Paltz which became a four year college the year she entered. Prior to this, colleges were normally three years. She became acquainted with Lake George from a roommate in college.

She always enjoyed visiting Lake George so she was excited to be offered a job teaching 6th grade. She met her husband while teaching at Lake George. "He was in the army but he used to come into the gym and shoot baskets." After they were married, she gave up full time teaching to raise their four children but continued substitute teaching. I asked her what inspired her to be a teacher and she said she didn't know why she wanted to teach but she always did. Mrs. Earl says "I was born to teach." She was also a National PTA State Officer where she ran workshops.

Finally, I asked Mrs. Earl: What's the most important life lesson you think our generation should learn from yours? Her response: "You need to set goals. Live your life with goals in mind and even when things are tough, keep striving to accomplish those goals because you only have one life to live. It's important to make the most of it. Also, friends are very important as you get older."

Currently, Mrs. Earl lives happily with her daughter in Lake George. She says she's very fortunate her children are still around. She even has a 4 year old great grandchild whom she hasn't yet met in person, only via the T.V. Getting to know Mrs. Earl a little bit better and hearing about her life when she was growing up was a wonderful experience and I hope she inspires you as much as she inspired me.
