May: Time for "A New Thing"

"Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." Isaiah 43:19

This morning was one of those days. We missed the bus! You watch it come and go right from the living room window, and with it, the small but certain wave of disappointment of the day not quite starting off on the right foot. Quickly you recalibrate, and offer something like, "well, at least now you can take your time and finish the rest of your toast." Not very helpful!

For our "take two," we hopped in the car, and the radio was tuned to the news full of the latest headlines — everything from cable TV anchors to the war in Ukraine—the level of concern rises as we turn onto West Mountain Road, the car silent, pondering the weight of the world, and a welcome perspective on the challenges we face verses the ones others face across the globe.

At some point, a song from a favorite Spotify playlist was chosen, I think it was from Abba. A tiny glimmer of light and levity returned. By the time we arrived at the school, everyone was in good enough form, and off they went with about 25 lbs of backpack and sports and musical instruments and lunch and water bottle balanced on their backs. I thought, *this can't be good for them to haul all that every day*, but they seem to manage just fine. I watched as they made their way to the door and disappeared inside the building.

On the return trip home, now solo in the car, I tuned the radio again to my go-to, NPR, and to my surprise and delight, there began a segment about the stresses of daily life. The segment took the listener to an audio meditation of sorts, a recording from a hike up Hackensack Mountain in Warrensburg, where the young woman making the recording spent more time listening to nature sounds than speaking into her microphone. You heard birdsongs, lots of them, and the scurry of chipmunk feet, and then utter stillness. The wind rustled, and then came the rhythmic drill of a woodpecker searching for breakfast. As she hiked, she described the Adirondack



scenery in the early Spring sunlight which penetrated her skin giving her more warmth outdoors than she'd had in months. She described the view of the village, complete with church spires and shops and streets, and the reminder that we live in a place where winter likes to hang on for as long as it can, but with Spring comes the welcome return of new life, the wonder of creation and its cycles.

Needless to say, by the time I pulled into the driveway, my day had been totally re-established, grounded in the landscape of creation's quiet yet constant promise of hope and new beginnings everywhere you turn. As I often do with bright points in my day, I made a mental note to be sure to play the NPR audio postcard for my family later tonight when we gather for dinner.

I love the words of the Prophet Isaiah: "Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." Isaiah 43:19. My prayer is that you have a chance to get outside in these days of Spring and take in the wonders of new life happening all around us, and that those

moments become for you holy moments where God makes a way in the wilderness of whatever you may be facing, a river in the desert, so that your heart is gladdened.

Every morning is a chance to step forth again as our world opens up and as nature unfurls its wonders of spring. God invites us to find time to be still, so still that you can hear the birdsongs; so still that you can begin to hear your own song once again, and the new thing God is inviting you to perceive, to behold, and to be glad.

The Haiti Mission School Newsletter for May 2023

General Haiti News:

As violence and chaos continue to rage on in Port au Prince, citizens armed with shovels, sticks and machetes are beginning to take matters into their own hands. Within the last few days the people of Port au Prince have killed more than a dozen gang members. They say they want their city back, they want their children to be able to go to school, they want to be able to work their businesses and most of all they want the threat, violence, chaos and terror of gang rule to stop. The UN is begging for someone to step in and help bring the violence under control. Canada is hoping the US will step in, the US is hoping Canada will be the ones, consequently no help is forthcoming. Who can fault the citizens for taking the law into their own hands? However, it is a gruesome situation to watch.

Meanwhile, out on the peninsula in Jeremie Town and the surrounding countryside, things are calming and except for the limited supplies, slow and unpredictable deliveries and high costs of goods, life seems to be moving more towards normal. We are grateful for this and continue to pray for God's hand in raising up leaders from among Haiti's people who will love God and the Haitian people and do what is right by all.

School News:

By the time this news arrives in your box it will be May. The school year is rapidly moving towards competition. We are sending what we believe to be the last two months of tuition for our 24 secondary school students. The average cost per student per month is about \$20, which remains quite a bargain as we look at the cost of education here in the US. There is some question if our students will go for an additional month because they were month late getting started. We await decisions from the Haitian Department of Education and the officials at College Dumas where our

students attend school.

For our primary school students it is time to purchase and deliver another \$1000 in food supplies to get our students through the month of May. Even with fewer students, the costs continue to escalate because of increasing shortages and costs in goods and transportation.

One of our supporters donated money to purchase shoes for those who cannot attend school because they have no shoes. Like here, students are required to wear shoes in order to attend school. Unlike here, not everyone has shoes. In order to preserve their shoes and hand them down to other siblings the students do not wear their shoes as they walk to and from school. They carry their shoes, like the little girl to the right, and put them on when they arrive at school.

College News:

We reported in the April news letter that we are providing food for Bruno who is attending the College of Dental Science in Jeremie. Bruno and Junior went shopping for his food of rice, beans and oil. This is Bruno picking up his food for the month. Bruno continues to be very excited about his opportunity to attend dental college. He is so very grateful for this opportunity. As I look at him, I cannot believe how much he has grown up and matured since the last time I saw him in person.



Home Repairs:

We are pleased to report we have completed rebuilding the earthquake destroyed walls of another Haiti Mission School student home. The father in this family was so grateful for the help with their home, for the opportunity for their children to attend the Haiti Mission School and the opportunity for them to have a hot meal each school day. Unfortunately, just before their home was completed, Mr. MacLine passed away so please keep this family in your prayers.

It cost \$2,300 to purchase the materials, transport them from town to the drop off place along the road where they were carried on the backs of people and a mule to this home about an hour into the mountains. We also payed a boss mason to do the work and for Junior to oversee the process and do the purchasing etc. In addition to the transporting the family carried water, mixed sand and concrete and put in other sweat equity to help in the rebuilding of their home.

The money to rebuild the walls of this home was donated by Trinity Presbyterian Church in Scotia, NY. The MacLine family sends their grateful thanks and wishes you many blessings.

They are currently using tarps supplied by the school after the earthquake to enclose her home and protect she and her family from the elements, from people trying to steal from her and for a little privacy. There are 6 people living in this home. Two children from this family attend the Haiti School. The family also lost their 3 goats in the earthquake and their outdoor kitchen space and all that was in it burned to the ground.

May Mission of the Month Coalition of Immokalee Workers

Our mission for May was chosen in memory of Helene Horn. Helene served on the Mission Committee for decades and was chairperson for multiple terms. To honor her dedication to helping others, we have selected a concern that she felt strongly about, migrant workers and their working conditions.

The <u>Coalition of Immokalee Workers</u> (CIW) advocates for workers to improve housing, fair wages, ending forced labor and other human rights abuses in the fields.

CIW is a worker-based human rights organization internationally recognized for its achievements in fighting human trafficking and gender-based violence at work. The CIW is also recognized for the development of the Worker-driven Social Responsibility model, a worker-led, market-enforced approach to the protection of human rights in corporate supply chains. In 2011, CIW launched the Fair Food Program (FFP), a groundbreaking model for Worker-driven Social Responsibility (WSR) based on a unique partnership among farmworkers, Florida tomato growers, and participating retail buyers, including Subway, Whole Foods, and Walmart. In 2015, the Program expanded into other states and additional produce items.

Under the FFP:

- --Workers clock into work on farms who participate in the Fair Food Program.
- --CIW conducts worker-to-worker education sessions, held on-the-farm (and on-the-clock) on the new labor standards set forth in the program's Fair Food Code of Conduct; --The Fair Food Standards Council, a third-party monitor created to ensure compliance with the FFP, conducts regular audits and carries out ongoing complaint investigation and resolution.

--Participating buyers pay a small Fair Food premium which tomato growers pass on to workers.

The FFP standards are enforced through market consequences guaranteed by CIW's legally binding Fair Food Agreements, in which participating buyers commit to buy Florida tomatoes only from growers in good standing with the FFP, and to cease purchases from growers who have failed to comply with the code of conduct. The United Nations Working Group on Business and Human Rights has described the FFP model as "a smart mix of tools" that "could serve as a model elsewhere in the world."

NEW HEARING ASSIST DEVICES:

We are thrilled to announce that thanks to a very generous donation from an anonymous donor, as well as the devotion of Dave King and the technical expertise of Ray Supply, Caldwell Church now has a newly installed upgraded Williams AV Hearing Assistance System in the sanctuary! The new system includes the transmitter, which provides both FM and WiFi signal options, four rechargeable receivers with surround earphones, two neckloops for use with T-Coil equipped hearing aids, and a wireless access point which is used to provide the Wifi functionality for the system. *Please stay tuned* for a training time to be announced for after worship for those interested in using the system!

SAFETY TEAM UPDATE:

Thanks to a grant for our Preschool through Warren County, we now have new air purifiers for the Preschool and therefore have equipped the rest of the Church with an air purifier in every meeting room including the Coffee Room, the Middle Room, and the Church offices. We care about your health and safety and continue to do all we can to create an environment where everyone feels welcome and safe to return to gathering regularly!

Cleanse us and renew a right and steadfast spirit within us we pray.


