Dear Caldwell Church Family,

As we approach the 3rd week of Lent, I hope you have enjoyed the daily devotions on the d365 app as I have. Engaging this devotion is a simple daily action that allows us to intentionally "sit up straight" and tend to our walk of faith. Lent is the season to take note of ourselves—not just as individuals, but also in our common humanity, and to tend to the places of struggle, avoidance, sin, and regret.

I love Barbara Brown Taylor's wise advice for Lent and turn to it each year. She points to the hollowness all of us can sometimes feel; it is not a sign of something gone wrong. It is the holy of holies inside of us, the "uncluttered throne room of the Lord our God." And rather than seek to fill it, with food or sweets, TV or social media, or other things, we would do ourselves some good to let it remain open, and let God alone fill the hollowness. Lent is a time to *make time* to sit alone in silence, which is to sit alone with God, and to wander the rooms of your heart. And when we do, our faith tells us we will begin to see a glow of something bright. As the prophet Isaiah writes, "your light shall break forth like the dawn..."

This Lent, let us remember the simple and profound truth of the gospel: we are sons and daughters of God, forgiven and freed from the weight of our sin, loved by the God we know in Jesus Christ—who leads us toward Holy Week, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter, the same God who keeps calling us out, calling us back, summoning us, saying, "Turn again to me. I will may you whole."

Here is a prayer I've been praying –it's from one of the d365 devotions:


God,

Our mission is to provide a Hand of Hope to those seeking help through life's difficult situations.

North Country Ministry was founded in North Creek in 1992 by a small group of Catholic nuns and priests who saw great need in the area and few resources to address it. Since then, NCM has become a cornerstone of the southeastern Adirondack region, providing critically needed human services.

Our programs offer a range of assistance including everyday needs such as food, clothing and furniture, to emergency assistance through our outreach services. Over the years, these programs have impacted the lives of thousands living in our extremely rural and underserved 650-square-mile service area.

Today, North Country Ministry thrives in large part due to the commitment of our 100+ volunteers. Through their generosity and dedication, our volunteers give nearly 7,000 hours each year to the operation of NCM. They provide day-to-day support for our programs, organize fundraisers and events, as well as serving in specialized or advisory capacities on our Board of Directors.

North Country Ministry is a subordinate organization of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Albany and enjoys ecumenical collaboration with a wide variety of churches and congregations throughout our service area. Our partnership is motivated by both in service to faith and a commitment to help those less fortunate.

In addition, we hold great gratitude and appreciation for our generous base of donor support. It is their consideration and contribution that helps our mission thrive so we may impact as many lives as possible.

With locations in Warrensburg, North Creek, and Brant Lake, we are able to serve the needs of our communities and assist a population living in an area with a high poverty level. It is because of our dedicated volunteers, the collaboration of our faith community, and the generosity of our donors that North Country Ministry is able to offer a *Hand of Hope* to those in need here in the Adirondacks.



News From The Haiti Mission School for March 2024

General Haiti News:

The general news from Haiti is changing, however not for the better. I spoke with Junior for about an hour this week and remain in contact with him regularly electronically. The Manifestations (Demonstrations) are becoming more frequent, more intense and closer to home. The common people/peasants want Acting Prime Minister Ariel Henri' to resign and allow national elections for a new government. They hope they will have some representation if the elections were to happen. More of the wealthy and business people and the US Embassy continue to support Henri' and he remains in office. In Port au Prince....the gangs now control: The Harbor

(where they have had control for a while), access to the International Airport which happened just a few weeks ago, all roads leading into and out of the city (happening over time) now much of the countryside and into the small towns such as Jeremie. Some say Henri' is using the gangs to stay in power.

The situation in Jeremie continues to deteriorate. There are increasing numbers of guns, the demonstrations are becoming more frequent and dangerous because of the anger and the guns. Never a good combination. The schools in Jeremie town are closed because it is too dangerous for the children to be on the street, even accompanied by a parent. The main market was closed for a brief period and has now reopened. The stores downtown close on days of Manifestation (Demonstration) and then reopen again. Prices continue to increase exponentially as food, goods, gas etc. become shorter and shorter in supply.

At the Haiti Mission School in Labastille:

We actually continue to hold classes and have been feeding our students daily. Sometimes it pays to be 20-30 minutes by motorcycle and and the 30+ minutes of walking time out of the town. Our Primary and Secondary students and their families are all safe and are doing the best they can at this time with relatives from the towns moving back with them. We are sometimes short teachers because they cannot get out of town and into the countryside. We have temporarily lost our source for sending money to Haiti so we are concerned about food for March. We

are working on another source so please keep this and our students and their families in your prayers. It is also time for another three months of tuition. Fortunately, we usually have a grace period on that so our students will be continuing school until we get this worked out. Our College Students (4 of 5 of them) are attending colleges in Jeremie so they are out of class for now. That means they will need to make up their time by going longer days, Saturdays or later into the summer.

<u>A New Road??</u>

Meanwhile, out in the Labastille area the government (whoever that is) decided to provide the people of the area an earth mover and driver to help cut a road to replace the walking path up into the mountains. The catch to this is the people of the area, if they want the road, and they do, are required to provide money for the gas. As an entire area they came together and decided to borrow money for the gas. They were concerned that it may be many years, if ever, before they will

have this opportunity again. They have asked the school for money to help pay for the gas and we were very sorry to say that we were unable to help them at this time and that their request is outside the parameters of our Charter. We did tell them we would try to let people know about their needs and if anyone felt called to help them with donations for gas we would send the

money to their committee. So, if anyone among you feels so called please send your donation to the above address marked for 'Road Project Gas'.
